CHECK-IN: Welcome everyone. You answer the 3 questions first, then go around the circle.

- 1. What is your first name?
- 2. What is a highlight or lowlight that happened this past week?
- 3. What personal goal did you write down last time, and how did it go?

Kick-off Question: You go first, then go around the circle. When was a time when you decided to change plans and do something completely different?

Read Bridge: Changing plans is part of life — we change driving routes. We change how we spend our finances. We change habits. And we even change careers. But to change directions, you have to leave something behind in order to gain something new. Today's story is about making a change that will cost you everything. But don't be deceived. You will gain more than you ever dreamed about. As we get started, I'll have prayer, and then we need two volunteers. Who would read Jesus' command in Mark 1:15? And who else would read the story in Luke 19:1-10? After the story, I'll prompt us as we try to retell the story together from memory, with as many details as possible. The Bible records lots of predictions that come true in Jesus' life simply because He obeyed what God said to do. Believe it or not, today's story describes something that Jesus would do 500 years before it actually happened. As we get started, I'll have prayer, and then we need two volunteers. Who would read Jesus' command in James 1:22-25? And who else would read the story in **Matthew 21:1-11?** After the story, I'll prompt us as we try to retell the story together from memory, with as many details as possible. But let's pray before we read.

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6 Questions: Cut on the dotted line and distribute around the circle. Ask, "Who has question one?"

1. If disobedience to God's commands leads to self-deception. Why do you think people typically do what they think is best instead of simply obeying God's commands?

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- 2. Let's read verse 4 & 5 again. When Jesus rides in on a colt, what do you think He was announcing to everyone? And what do you think would have happened if Jesus had decided to disobey God?

How do I visit these people I *already* know?

KNOCK \rightarrow **COMPLEMENT** \rightarrow **ASK** — In that order.

1) KNOCK on their "door" (at home or at work).

- "It has been some time since we've connected. How are you all doing?"
- We initiate conversations with people all the time.
- It is something we naturally do in life.

2) COMPLEMENT them.

- "The reason I stopped by is I really like your mailbox."
- A sincere compliment opens their hearts.

3) ASK a question.

"Where did you get it?"

4) LISTEN — Where is God working in their life?

- People talk about God without religious language.
- Spiritual conversations include concerns for family members, personal crises, medical concerns, a challenge they are facing, etc.
- 5) PRAY If appropriate, ask them if you could pray for their situation.

Practice "Knocking" on a Friend's Door.

- 1. Everyone stands up and forms two equal lines that face each other.
- 2. One line holds up their hand so the person facing them can knock on their hand (a door).
- 3. Compliment them on an imaginary item like their mailbox, flower bed, boat, garden, car, etc.
- 4. Ask them a question about it. Reverse the roles. The other person holds up their hand (a door).
- 5. Once both people have taken turns practicing, one line stays put. One line shifts to the right.
- 6. Practice with your new partner. Continue practicing and shifting until the line comes full circle.

Who would read Jesus' command in Matthew 10:7-8? And who else would read the story in Matthew 10:9-15? After the story, I'll prompt us as we try to retell the story together from memory, with as many details as possible. But let's pray before we read.

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6 Questions: Cut on the dotted line and distribute around the circle. Ask, "Who has question one?"

1. Let's read verses 7-8 again. Why do you think this is not the norm today? And for us to live our lives like this, what do you think it would practically look like?



2. Considering the end of verse 8, What are some of the specific things God has given to us that we can freely give to others?



Video Part A – The Story

If you turn on the television or look at your Facebook feed, it's clear that we live in a broken world. There's a lot of death, disease, and suffering.

But we also see traces of beauty...like the beauty of a sunset or the laugh of a child. And that's because the world as God made it was not broken. There was no death, disease, or suffering. But starting with the very first people, we chose to leave God's perfect design and go our own way. And that's called SIN.

Sin is what led us to this state of brokenness and sinfulness. We don't like to be in brokenness, so we try to get out. So for some... they think if I can call the ladder of success, that will get me out of brokenness. Others think if I can just be a good person or be religious and go to church, that will get me out. And others try to drown it out with drugs and alcohol, relationships, or suicide attempts. But all these efforts to get out of brokenness by yourself lead to just snapping us back in like a bungee chord and leads to more brokenness. But God loved us so much that He did not want us to stay in brokenness. So He provided the only way out by doing for us what we could not do for ourselves, and that's through His son, Jesus. You see, Jesus came down into our world and allowed Himself to be killed on a cross, taking on our sins. And on the 3rd day, He rose from the dead. And He said if we would turn from our way, and surrender to Him, and make Him the king of our lives, that we'd be forgiven...and would be restored back into God's design for our life.



Kick-off Question: You go first, then go around the circle. What do you think makes the difference between a "good gift" and a "bad gift"?

Read Bridge: It seems that "good gifts" and "bad gifts" all depend upon the perspective of the person giving the gift or the person receiving the gift. Is our perspective always right, or could it be wrong? And what about God's perspective? We are about to read a very interesting story.
